We are community partners with Frimhurst Family House (ATD Fourth World). Venue hire at Frimhurst House has enabled Mustard Seed to expand the sensory and play therapy we are able to offer and start working with some children in groups. During the year payments of £3,344 were made to ATD Fourth World for venue hire.

One of the trustees, Jason French, is employed by ATD Fourth World, at Frimhurst. Mustard Seed has made provision in the decision making process and financial procedures to ensure that there are no issues arising from conflicts of interest.

All trustees give their time voluntarily and only receive payments for the reimbursement of expenses incurred on behalf of the charity. 1 trustee was reimbursed for travel, stationery and printing expenses in the year, totalling £123.57.

In planning our activities we keep in mind the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit.

We offer:

- Professional and practical support with communication, social, emotional and sensory difficulties in the home environment
- Play therapy for children with complex emotional difficulties
- Sensory Motor and Processing Therapy in a specially equipped venue
- Sensory Therapy in the home
- Attention and Interaction groups to support communication
- 6 week course supporting children with anxiety difficulties
- 6 week parent course for families
- Sibling support group
- · OT for schools support service
- Autism and Sensory courses for schools, organisations and other local professionals

In addition to our two Team Leaders (co-founders), we have a volunteer base of 17 people, assisting with various different activities.

We run a comprehensive training programme for all our volunteers involved in family and sibling support and are committed to on-going training for all our staff. Some volunteers who have completed the programme are now supporting our work with families. All volunteers have a mentor and follow our procedures on shadowing and supervision.

We also have 2 volunteers providing some administrative support.

Section D

Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

Over the course of the year we have supported 60 families, through a range of projects, to meet a variety of needs;

- 18 children supported one-to-one in the home
- 6 children received OT home support
- 2 children received play therapy
- 11 children received sensory motor processing therapy
- 5 children accessed the Ready Steady Go communications group
- developed a 6 week programme for supporting anxiety issues –
 "The Chill Out Zone". This course is now run every half term for small groups of children with high anxiety difficulties, related to autism. 10 children have accessed the programme this year.
- 19 families supported through the Empowering Parents course
- established a Sibling Support group; 15 children now attend once a month, on a Saturday morning.

Also during the year we piloted an OT for Schools service, providing professional occupational therapy. We offer assessment, one-to-one and group therapy, reports and staff training. 4 schools have accessed this service over the first few months. This service will continue to be offered for 2015/16.

A volunteer on secondment from John Lewis supported our work with families and administrative tasks for 6 months. During this time she also set up new systems, applied for funding, created databases and created termly newsletters for our supporters. She continues to be part of our volunteer base.

The charity continues to have a steady increase in donations.

There has also been an increase in voluntary contributions and income from fundraising events;

- Voluntary contributions of up to £5 per group session and £10 per 1:1 session are received from families, as a contribution towards the therapy and training sessions provided by Mustard Seed. The increase in this income is the result of the charity's increased activity.
- Mustard Seed has been developing fundraising activities and the use of volunteers to help with these, which has brought about a significant increase in the 2014/15 fundraising income.

However, there has been a significant drop in income received from grants in this financial year, falling from £16,020 in 2013/14 to £6,000 in 2014/15.

Expenditure has increased significantly, as the charity has sought to fund additional hours of consultancy work for a project co-ordinator, senior occupational therapist and the use of agency occupational therapists, to provide support, therapeutic intervention, education and practical advice to families. This has allowed the charity to increase the number of families it is able to work with. The increased activity also results in other expenditure increases, such as venue hire and resources & equipment.

Future Plans

A legacy donation received in 2015/16 will enable Mustard Seed to employ our Project co-ordinator and Senior occupational therapist on a 12-month fixed term contract. This will support on-going growth in service provision.

During 2015/16 Mustard Seed will be working to secure further funding, to be able to extend these contracts further.

The Trustee Board and senior management are currently working on the organisation's 3 year business plan.
